Future City Competition

Students learn engineering as they learn how cities work and learn valuable about teamwork and planning. Students better understand practical applications pf math, science, language arts, and computer learning as they design their cities.

School teams of 7th and 8th gradersstart by developing a project plan, designing their cities with SimsCity 3000 software, creating a scale model with recycled materials, and then make oral presentations and answer questions at the state competition.
